# AhAh-CHOO.... Is "Fido" suffering from seasonal allergies?

Spring has sprung and so have all of the allergic ailments of the season. Everyone recognizes the typical sneezing symptom associated with allergies, but most dogs exhibit symptoms through skin infections, ear infections and itching. There are a few main types of allergies that can affect your dog: atopic (skin) or inhalant such as airborne pollens, dust mites and mold, food allergies, and flea allergies. Some dogs can be reactive to *multiple* allergens.



#### Allergy Type

#### What Can You Do?

Atopic/Inhalant

- Shield dog from exposure of allergens: HEPA filter/air purifier for home, vacuum frequently, wipe paws off after being outdoors.
- Dr. prescribed medication, Allergy testing/treatments.
- Omega-3 fatty acids

Flea

Decrease exposure to flea bites through use of prescription topical flea medication as directed.

Food

- Hypoallergenic food and treats containing novel proteins
- Elimination diet if necessary.

Winslow Animal Hospital would like to remind you that while all flowers are beautiful, some varieties of plants can carry serious risks to your pets.
Autumn crocus, Azalea, Daffodils, Cyclamen,

Lilly of the valley, Oleander, Sago Palm, Iris, Morning Glory, Philodendron, Rhododendron and Tulips can all cause varying negative symptoms in cats and dogs. Be aware that it is not always the adult plant that

can be toxic. In some cases, it is the seeds or roots that cause the toxicity. In cats, most Lilies are extremely toxic and if ingested can be fatal, even in small amounts.

## Poison Prevention Awareness Month: March

Poison is a constant threat to pets, and it can come in many different packages. Here are some of the top poisons.

#### Dog Poisons:

- Chocolate (especially baker's chocolate)
- 2. Mouse and Rat Poisons
- 3. Vitamins and Minerals
- 4. NSAIDs (e.g., ibuprofen, naproxen, etc.)
- Cardiac Medications (e.g., calcium channel blockers, beta-

blockers, etc.)

- Cold and Allergy Medications (e.g., pseudoephedrine, phenylephrine, etc.)
- 7. Antidepressants (e.g., selective serotonin reuptake inhibitors)
- 8. Xylitol
- 9. Acetaminophen (e.g., Tylenol)
- 10. Caffeine Pills




# April is National Heartworm Awareness Month: Prevent Heartworm Year Round

Prevention is the key to your pet's protection against a heartworm infection! Dogs get heartworm disease by being bitten by an infected mosquito. Heartworm disease has been reported in all 50 states!

The only way heartworms are transmitted is through an infected mosquito, not from dog to dog. After a mosquito bites an infected dog, the worms must go through an incubation period in the mosquito.

It takes about seven months, once a dog is bitten by an infected mosquito, for the



larvae to mature into adult heartworms. They then lodge in the heart, lungs, and surrounding blood vessels and begin reproducing.

Adult worms can grow up to 12 inches in length, can live 5-7 years, and a dog can have as many as 250 worms in its system.

Heartworms can be destructive to the heart and may kill your dog. Prevention is vital to your dog's good health, affordable, and as easy as giving a tasty treat.

# April 20-26 is National Pet ID Week: Get Microchipped!

Microchips are tiny computer chips, about the size of a grain of rice. A microchip has a unique identification number stored on it. The microchip is usually inserted under the skin between the shoulders, and feels about the same as getting a vaccine.

When your pet gets microchipped, the number of his or her chip is registered. Then, if your pet should get lost and taken to an animal shelter, the people at the animal shelter can scan the microchip, call the registry, and find you! Even if your pet loses his or her collar, you have the benefit of knowing your pet can always be identified by that microchip!


Sentinel is a monthly oral preventive for dogs that guards against heartworms, adult roundworms, adult hookworms, whipworms, and prevents the development of flea eggs. Sentinel artificial beef flavored chewable tablets should be given every month year-round. Sentinel requires a prescription from your veterinarian. Store Sentinel at room temperature. Do not remove the tablet from its wrapper until ready to give the medicine. Keep this medication away from children and pets.
